The Course

Canterbury Golf Club, home to one of the most acclaimed courses in the United States, was designed by Herbert Strong and opened for play in 1921. Located approximately 10 miles southeast of Cleveland in Beachwood, Ohio, Canterbury Golf Club is recognized by Golf Digest as one of the top 100 courses in America, and by playing host to the 70th Senior PGA Championship will become just the second U.S. club behind Oak Hill Country Club of Rochester, N.Y., to welcome all U.S. men's rotating championships.

Canterbury Golf Club opened its doors to premier championships in 1932, hosting the Western Open won by Ralph Guldahl in a playoff over Horton Smith. It followed by hosting the 1940 and 1946 U.S. Open Championships, won respectively by Lawson Little and Lloyd Mangrum.

In 1964, Canterbury hosted the U.S. Amateur Championship, won by William Campbell of Huntingdon, W. Va.; and in 1973, Ohio native Jack Nicklaus marked the 55th PGA Championship as his 14th major title. In 1996, Dave Stockton posted a two-stroke victory at Canterbury to win the U.S. Senior Open.

Canterbury was constructed to embrace the natural topography of high elevation, rolling hills, flowing brooks and lush wooded areas.

Architect's Notes

I visited Canterbury for the first time this May (2009) for a practice round during the 70th Senior PGA Championship. I had wanted to do this course since 1996, when the Senior Open was at Canterbury, but just never got around to it. It is impressive what Herbert Strong was able to do with such a small amount of land (146 acres). Recently, much as at Oakmont, the trees have been thinned out to open up some of the views. Numbers sixteen; seventeen and eighteen have been called the best finishing holes in golf.

For the Senior Championship some of the order of the holes were changed (an example: Numbers 10 thru 15 were changed to 1-6) for television most probably. In this version, I have kept the original routing.

As always, I used "Google Earth" and "Virtual Earth" to recreate the layout and help with the planting locations. I based elevations on a topo map of the area and photos of the course.
